March 25<sup>th</sup>, 2023

- Nicole made three visits to the BL elementary school to read to different classes in April. Nicole also visited the Early Learning Center to read to children and provide a craft for the children.
- Teresa attended the DeSoto high school and visited with students looking at careers in early education to stress the importance of reading in early education as well as give them bags with literature to help with their education.
- The library will be giving William Allen White books to the 5th graders at the elementary school. We have ordered and received the books for Jayne to hand out to the students when she returns.
- Nicole's last day will be April 29th and Jayne will return May 2nd. We will be having a welcome-back meeting/staff meeting to make sure everyone is up to speed and there is no lapse in our forward momentum for the summer reading programs with the staff, including Jayne and Nicole.
- Nicole will be available some, over the summer and is willing to fill in when needed if she is available.
- Amy will be taking over the "Cozy Tea Time" book club with Nicole's departure.
- Amy will begin a twice-a-month walking club in May on Wednesdays.
- Kidz Klub has been somewhat sporadic but in April we have had a group of about 6 kids, with parents, come in two of the Thursdays to play Nintendo. We had considered shutting down Kidz Klub, at least for the summer, but will continue and evaluate over the next couple of months.

## **Linwood Community Library**

The Northeast Kansas Library System inspires and empowers member libraries to engage, educate and add value to their communities.

This is our mission. In practice, we pursue this mission by providing an array of services and financial support to member libraries during the year.

- ✓ In 2022, <u>direct</u> financial support of the library in the form of grants and subsidies totaled **\$6,140**. This may have included grants and subsidies for accreditation, e-content, continuing education, courier services as well as various other services and resources.
- ✓ Some financial support benefited a cross section of membership. This included the Next Catalog, which was enhanced by Flipster and LinkedIn Learning.
- ✓ In addition, NEKLS staff provided library and information technology consulting and support to member libraries.

We admire the work you do in your communities and we appreciate the opportunity to support you in your efforts.

### Grants - \$2,298

Grants from NEKLS enable libraries to enhance collections, programs and services, and support employee and trustee continuing education.

#### \$1,250 Library Development Grant as an accredited Service Center II Library

Library Development Grants recognize libraries for accomplishing a rigorous set of library standards. This grant is typically the largest single grant to a member library.

#### \$875 Hoopla grant

E-content is a vital component of a public library's collection. NEKLS was pleased to support the library's efforts to provide content in diverse formats.

#### \$-- Continuing Education grants

Grants were available for educational programs that were not provided directly by NEKLS. Grant funds were allocated for library conferences and other continuing education activities. (NEKLS also offers CE grants for tuition for MLS degree college credits, which are paid directly to the student and not reflected here.)

#### \$-- Literacy Exploration Grant

Competitive grant to improve literacy in four areas: Literacy; Information & Digital Literacy; Financial Literacy; and Health Literacy.

#### \$173 Mileage Reimbursement Grant

Provided up to \$250 per library for Summer Library Performer mileage expenses.

#### \$-- Substitute Librarian Program

Eligibility limitations apply. Must be used to provide library coverage while the director attends a continuing education activity, a legislative advocacy event, or a NEKLS committee meeting. NEKLS will provide financial support of \$8.00 per hour with no benefits.

## Courier Subsidies – \$2,713

The library is a participant in *Kansas Library Express*, the statewide courier service. For 2022, the library's volume of shared and borrowed materials necessitated receiving 5-days-a-week service. (This <u>volume</u> determines whether a library is billed for 3-days or 5-days-a-week service.)

For 2022, the approved base courier rate for 5-days-a-week service was \$2,900. The KLE Policy Committee opted to replace this base rate for 2022 with a COVID Relief rate of \$2,600. In turn, NEKLS subsidized the COVID Relief rate, volume fees and fuel surcharges.

### Direct Subsidies – \$1,129

Member libraries may benefit from several direct subsidies. The figures listed below are specific to your library.

#### \$-- Architectural Services

Libraries must apply. Provided funds remained available throughout the year, NEKLS paid up to \$2,800 for a library to consult with Sabatini Architects.

#### \$270 Legal Consultations

Libraries must apply. Provided funds remained available throughout the year, NEKLS supported a library's initial consultation with an attorney of NEKLS' choosing. Usage not listed here.

#### \$500 APPLE

APPLE (APplied Public Library Education) is a training program for public library directors in Kansas. NEKLS covers the cost for enrollment and lodging, meals and mileage for any required in-person events.

#### \$119 E-Rate management services

Some libraries participate in the federal E-Rate Program. NEKLS partners with eRate Solutions LLC to help member libraries navigate the application process. NEKLS covered the cost of eRate Solutions' services.

#### \$49 Public computer stability – Deep Freeze

Deep Freeze protects endpoints by Freezing a snapshot of a computer's desired configuration and settings defined by the IT Admin. With an instant reboot, any unwelcome or unwanted changes are removed from the system, restoring it to its pristine Frozen state. NEKLS provided up to 20 seats per library.

#### \$30 Antivirus protection for computers – ESET

Computers need to be protected from viruses. NEKLS provided up to 20 seats per library.

#### \$99 Web Content Filtering – Cisco Umbrella

This web content filtering tool ensures public libraries are compliant with The Kansas Children's Internet Protection Act (KS-CIPA). NEKLS covered this cost for the library.

#### \$40 Annual Public Performance Site Licensing

An Annual Public Performance Site License allows you to legally show as many movies as you want anywhere inside your library for endless entertainment. NEKLS covered this cost for the library.

#### \$22 Kansas Libraries on the Web (KLOW)

NEKLS hosts the library's website.

#### \$-- Kansas State Park Passes

NEKLS paid for 25 passes for any library interested in participating.

#### \$-- StoryWalk

NEKLS held a competitive program where libraries could receive StoryWalk signs and backing panels.

#### Other Subsidies

In some instances, NEKLS provides support that has the potential to benefit all member libraries, but is difficult to quantify the impact on a specific library. The following areas may or may not have been used by your library or your patrons.

#### \$25,000 Cloud Library, State Library of Kansas

NEKLS purchased titles directly for the Cloud Library. This content is available to all library patrons in the NEKLS region.

#### \$1,424 OCLC WorldCat (ILL)

Used by NEKLS to assist libraries when items are not available through ShareIt (statewide ILL).

#### **S--** Recollections Kansas

Website hosting and training on use of hardware and software. NEKLS partners with other entities, including regional library systems, to offer this program.

## Next/Koha Coordination - Consortium-wide support

The success of Next is a group effort. As a member of the Next consortium, the library's participation fee for 2022 = \$1,500. Next members enjoyed:

#### \$11,025 Flipster

Flipster is a next-generation digital magazine distribution service which lets users access their favorite magazines. Users can download these magazines to read offline, anytime, anywhere. Some participating libraries purchased titles or provided funds for titles; the amount shown reflects funding provided directly by NEKLS for this service.

#### \$7,817 NoveList

Connecting users of the Next Catalog to their next great read. NEKLS covered the entire cost for NoveList.

#### \$20,000 LinkedIn Learning\*

Access to over 16,800 online, self-paced courses and Learning Paths on topics aimed at supporting personal and professional growth. NEKLS covered the entire cost for LinkedIn Learning. \*Note: LinkedIn Learning is under review and may not be renewed for 2023 due to low usage.

#### \$45,145 ByWater Solutions

Provides hosting, support services and KOHA developments.

#### \$ -- Next Catalog Coordinator

NEKLS has one position dedicated solely to the Next Catalog. Other staff provide training and other support, as needed.

#### **Continuing Education & Training**



## Treasurer's Report for the Linwood Community Library Board Meeting April 25, 2023

General Fund (GF) Checking account balance as of 3-31-2023 was \$357,398.36. The GF Checking account has NOT been proven to QuickBooks due to two small issues which Joyce had identified and was sorting out with the bank.

Capitol Improvement Fund (CIF) Checking account balance as of 3-31-2023 was \$151,504.71. The CIF Checking account has been proven to QuickBooks through 3-31-2023 noting no difference.

Petty Cash was counted by Teresa on 4-17-2023. She stated the balance was \$45.40.
