This award was presented to Hamilton County Library <u>Director Amy Brucker</u> at the KLA Conference in October. Our new FoKL Board President made news of her own during the annual KLA Conference in Overland Park. Director of the Hamilton County Library, Amy Brucker, was at the awards ceremony to receive the 2019 Best Small Public Library in Kansas Award on October 24.

The announcement generated excitement not only at the conference, but in her hometown newspaper as well. The Syracuse Journal featured the story on its front page, along with several photos taken at the conference. Journal Editor Marcus Ashlock reported the award was created to recognize a "creative and excellent library service, program or activity in a service community of less than 5,000."

Amy credits her staff's continued efforts to think outside the box to

help children and adults reach their reading goals. Staff provides many programs to the community, both inside and outside the library. "This honor was achieved through a committed staff, supportive library board and regional system, successful community partnerships, and an amazing community," Brucker said. "We embrace the idea of building community, both inside and outside our walls."

When submitting her library's application for the award, Amy detailed the services her library provides to youth as well as adults. Adult Librarian Caleb Platt coordinates adult programs which include partnering with the Hamilton County VIP Center for monthly events including trivia, movies and a book club. Youth activities are led by Children's Librarian Dallie Vernon and include traditional Story Hour, which rotates among local daycares.

Amy was also selected to present a breakout session at the KLA Conference titled, "10 Reasons Why You Need a Teen Friends Group." Joined by former Hamilton County Library employee and Library Leadership Group (LLG) member, Wyatt Carter, they spoke to a standing room only audience of over 70 in attendance. Much positive feedback was received for what their library accomplishes with the high school students in their community.

Building Community Partnerships

During the KLA conference in October, FoKL board members Judy Burgess and Barb Mathews were joined by Ashland Public Library Director Cara Vandarree to present a breakout session about Building Comunity Partnerships. The session's description was Synergy: the cooperation of two or more organizations to produce a combined effort greater than the sum of their separate effects!! Speakers talked about how local Friends groups can form community partnerships to make a greater impact with projects and programs. Examples of existing community projects across the state were shared. Working with partners increases Friends' visibility and leads to membership growth, while at the same time allowing for library advocacy. About 40 attended this lively session.
