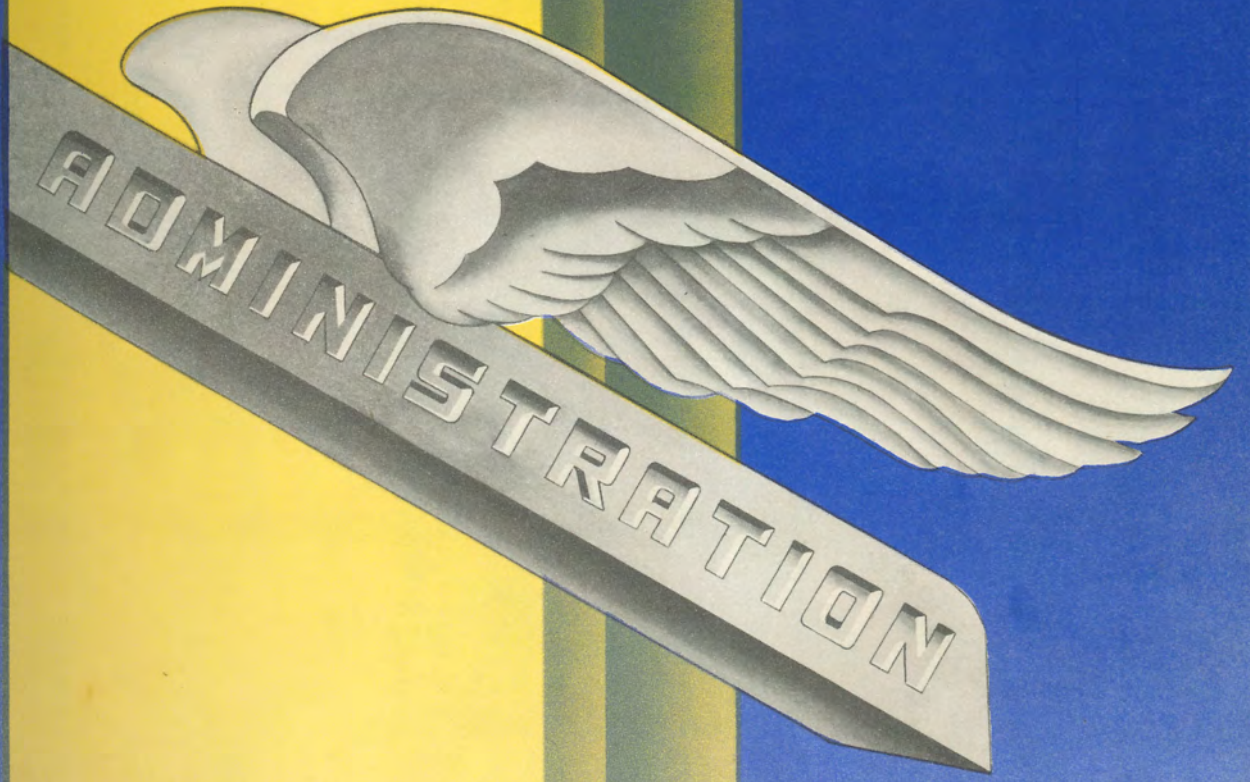


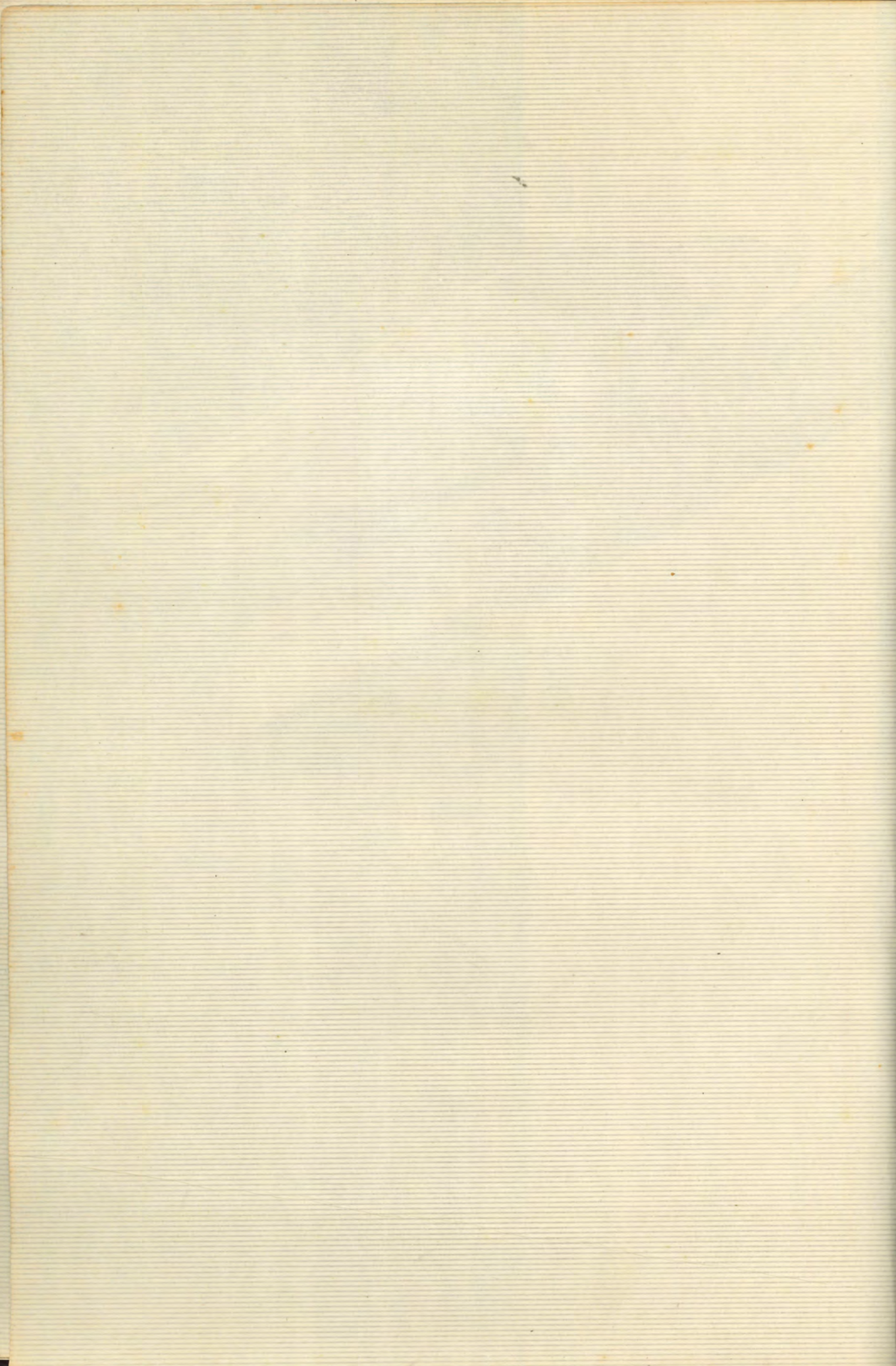


OUR AMBITIOUS QUINTUPLETS

SENIOR CLASS HISTORY

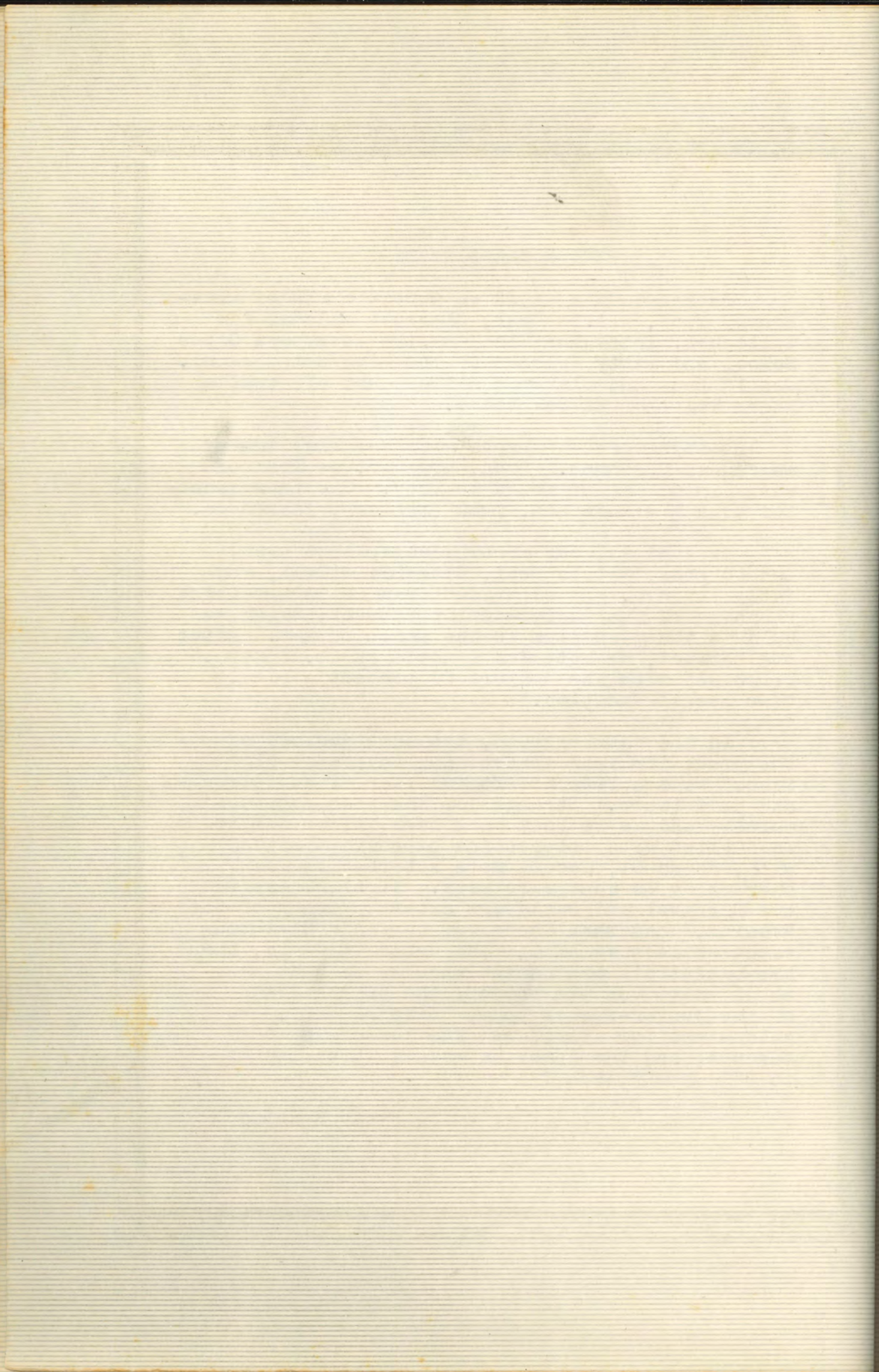

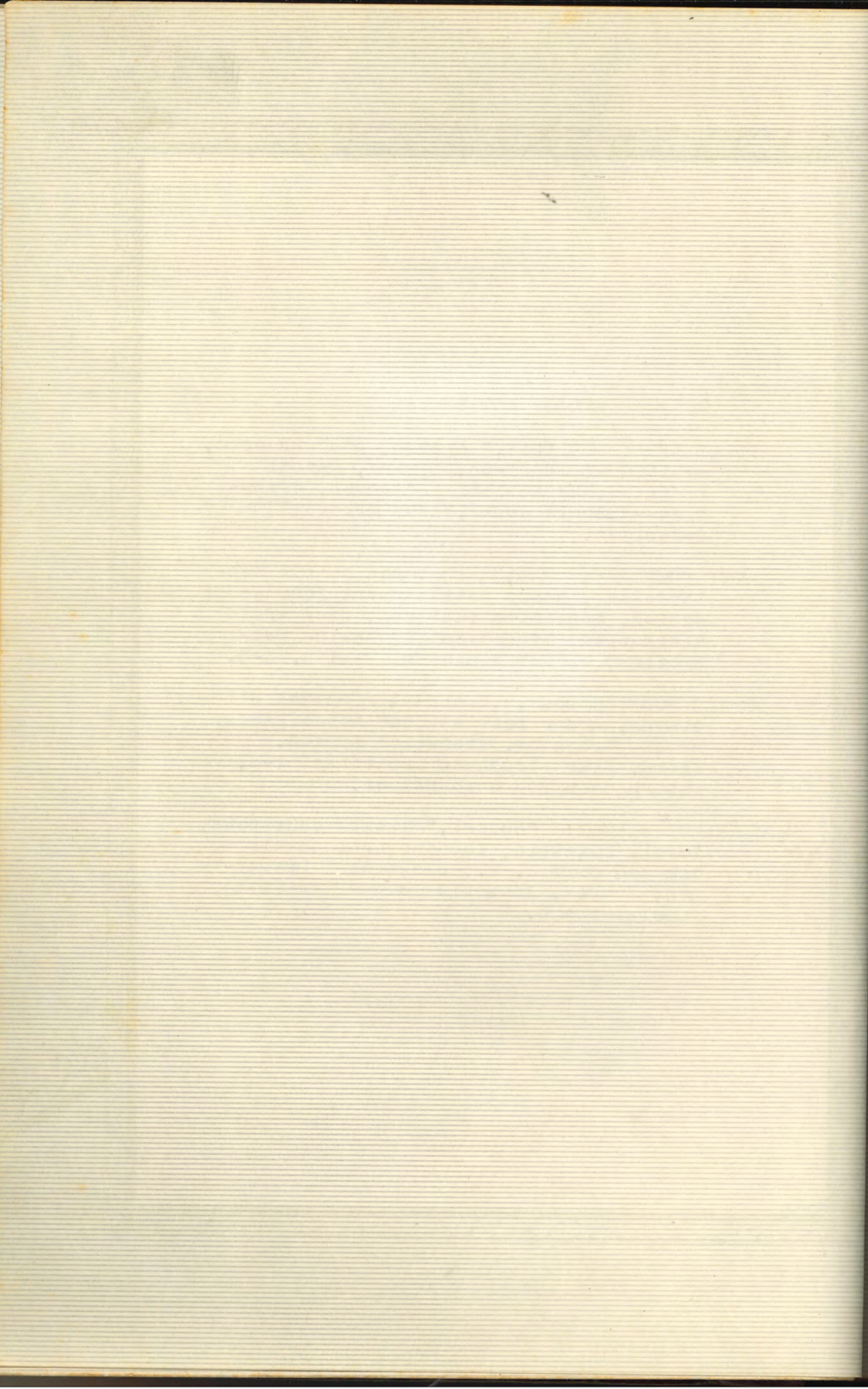
SENIOR ACTIVITIES

JUNIOR CLASS HISTORY

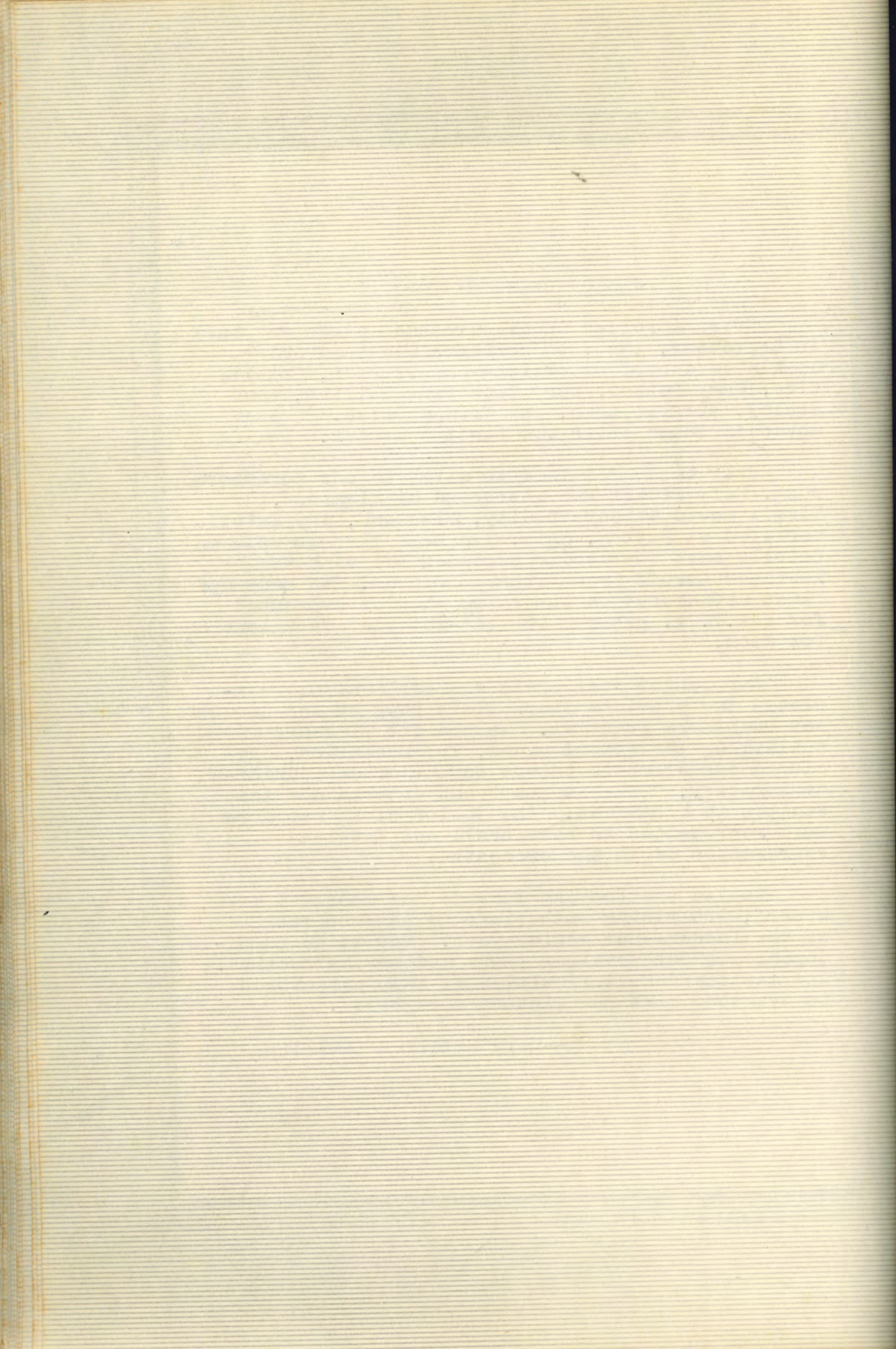

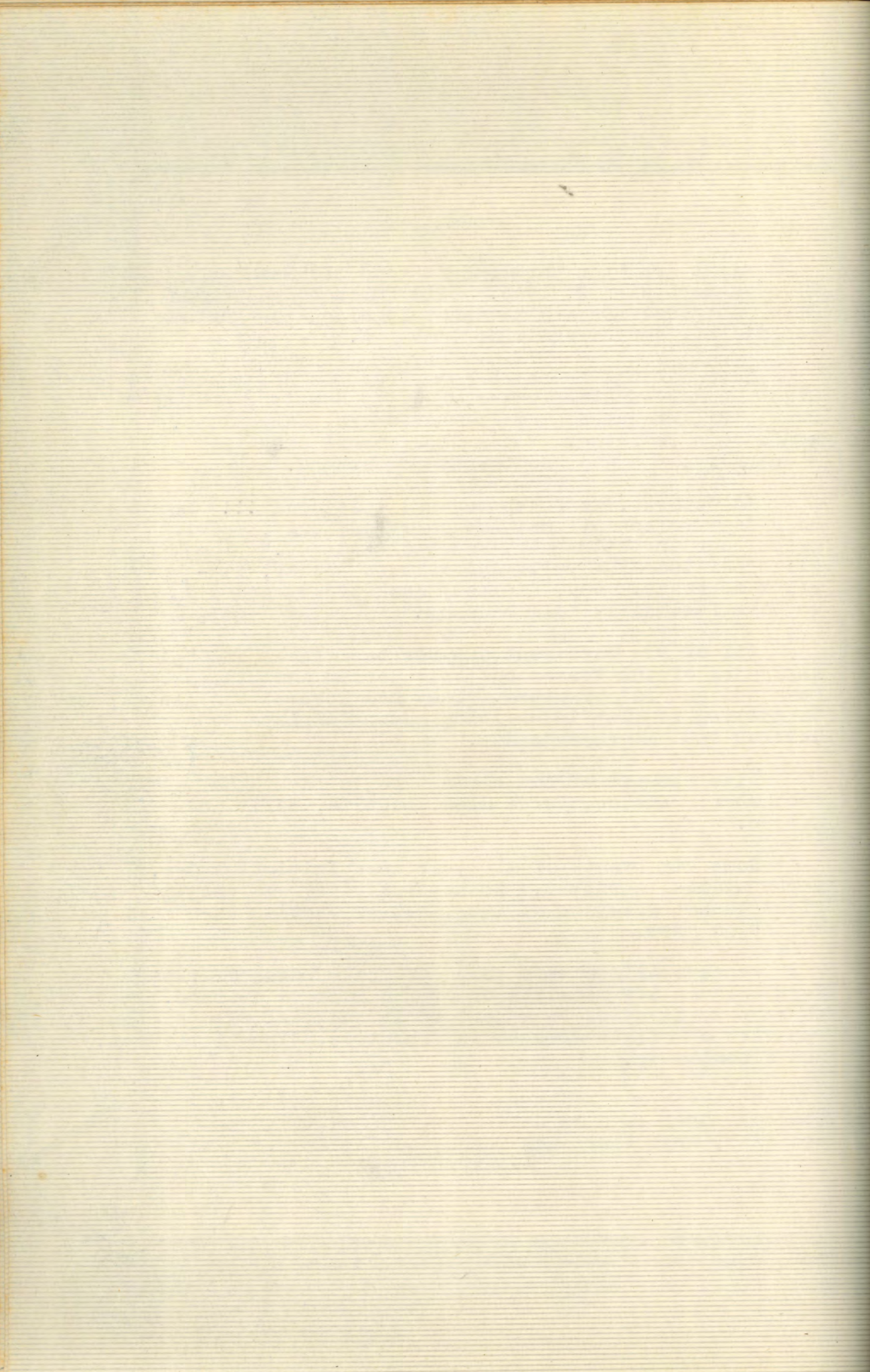
Five members of our class were in the school orchestra: Eunice, Verda Glee, LaQuita, Billy and Warren.

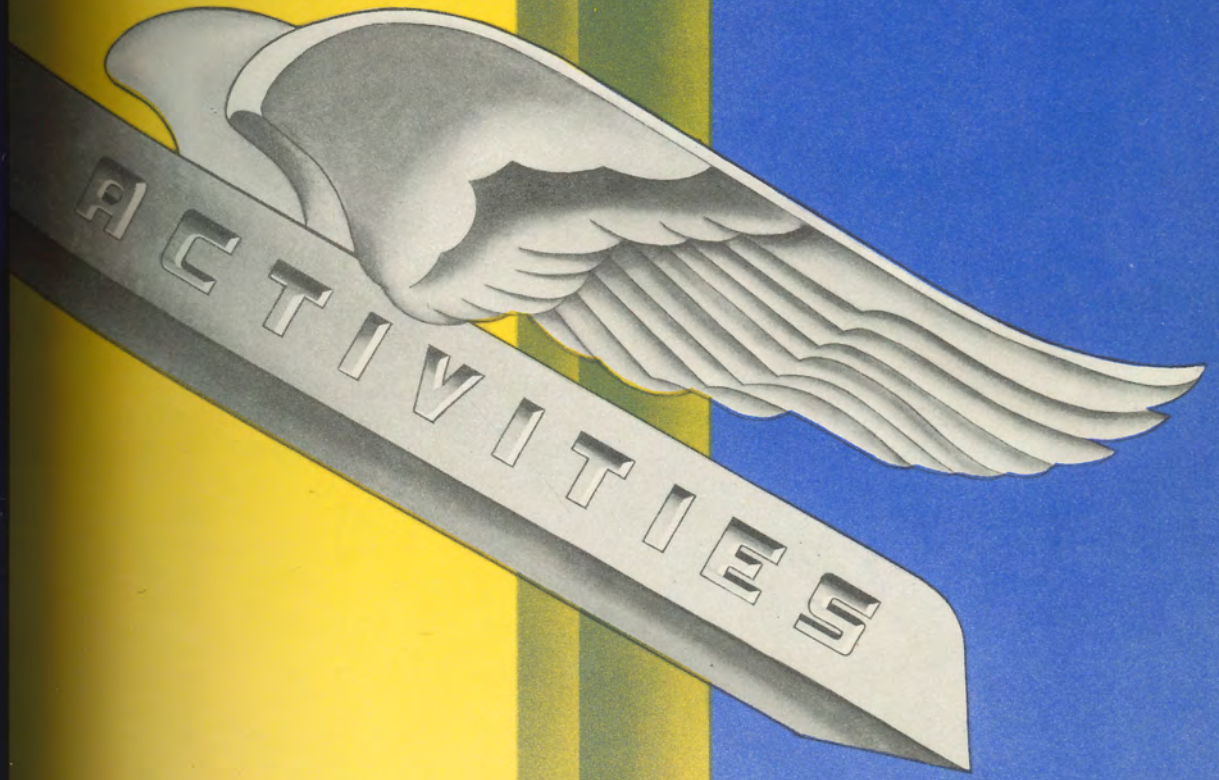
Some big events of the year were Initiation Day, party nights, carnival, the hayrack ride, and the first basketball game at home, not to mention examination days.

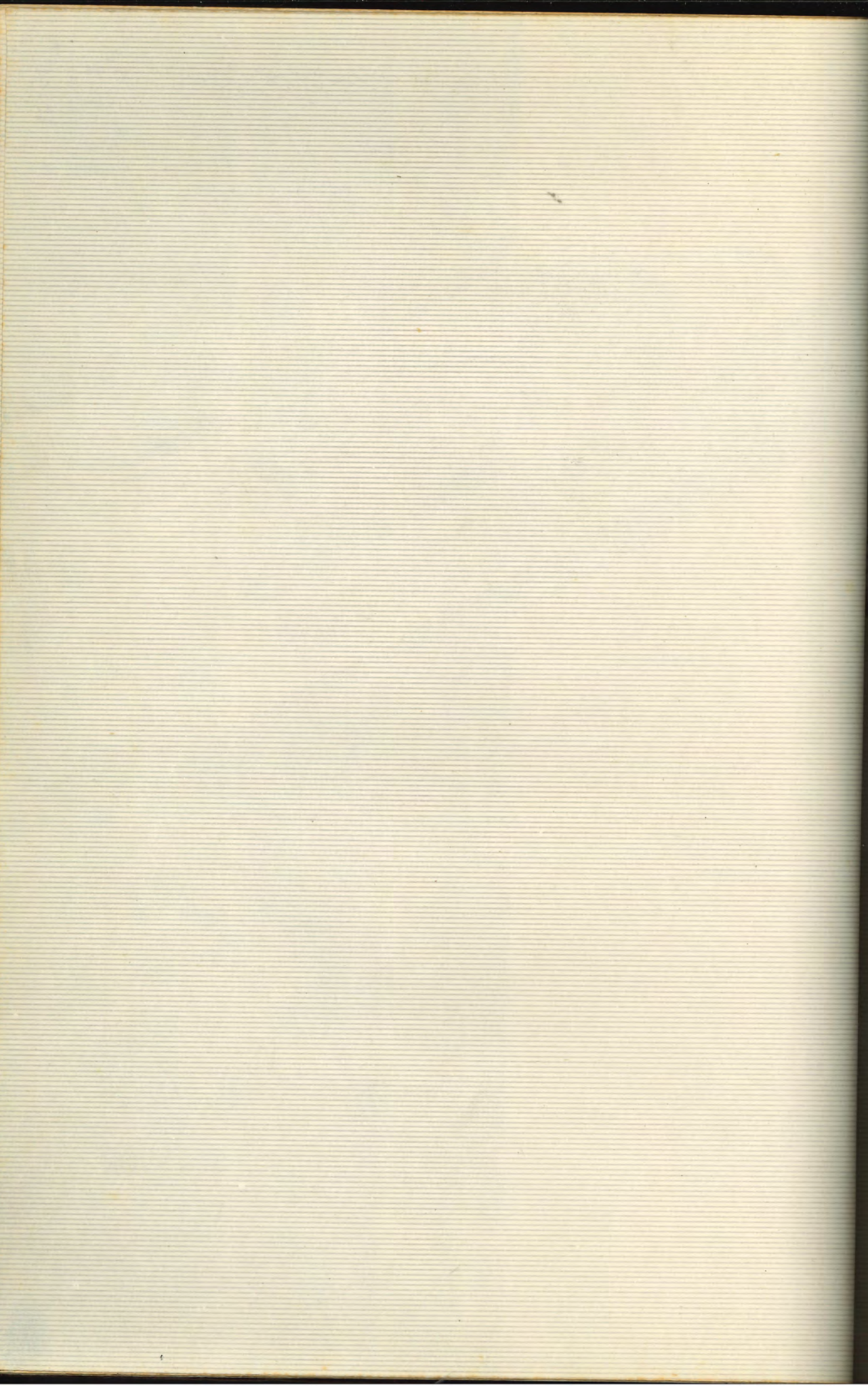

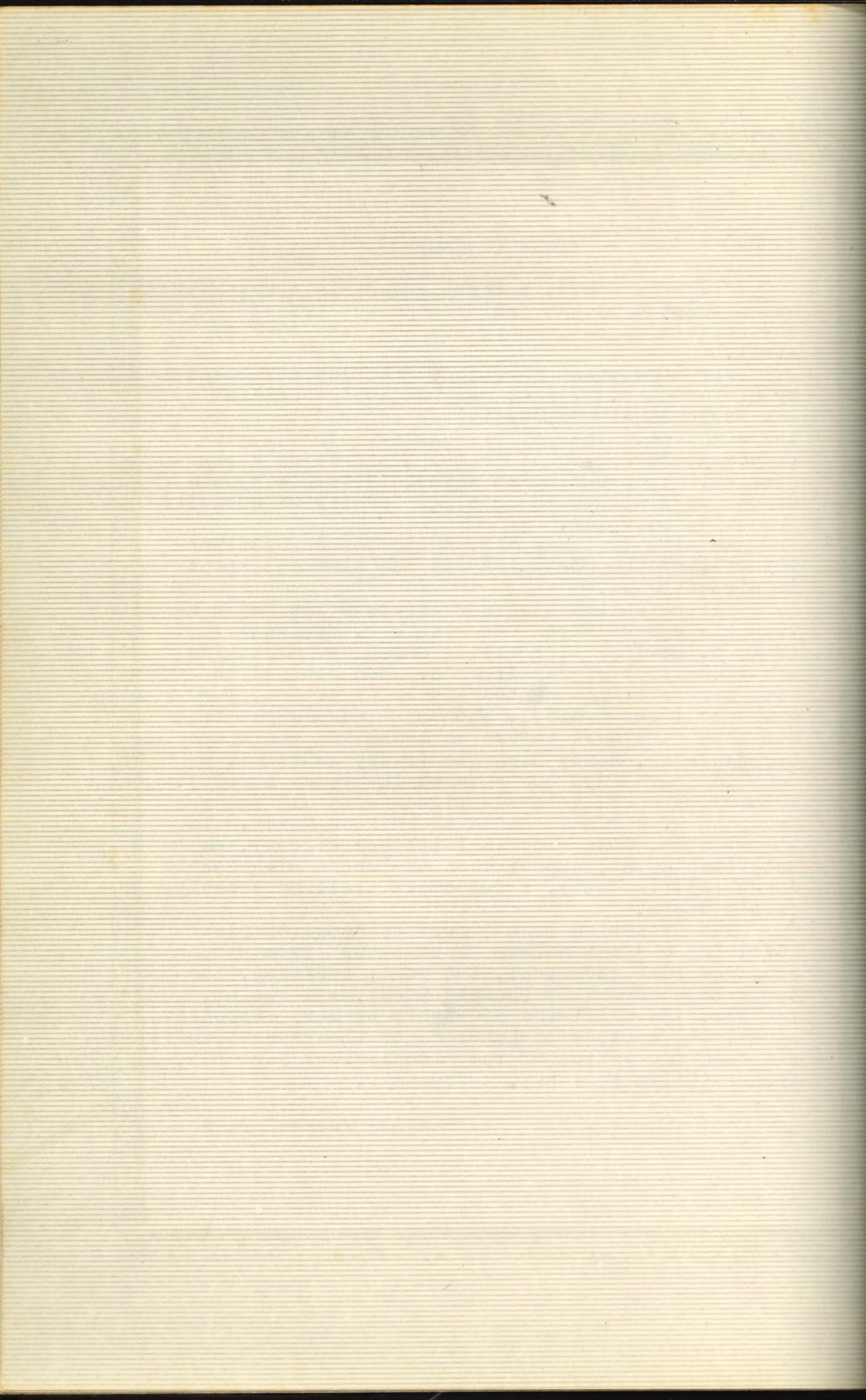
We wish to thank Mrs. Sheda for her patience with all of the obstacles and the time she spent in directing us.

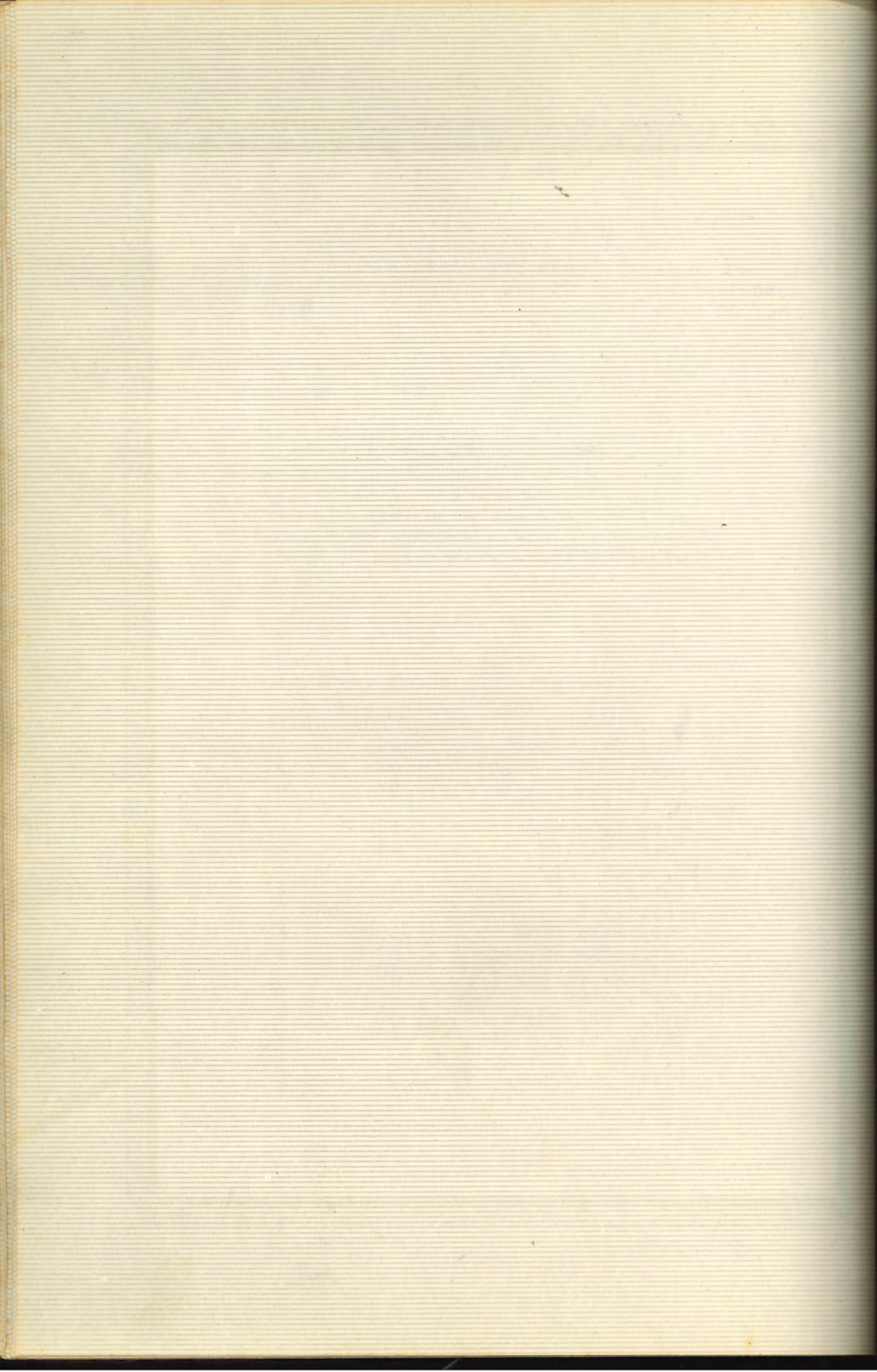

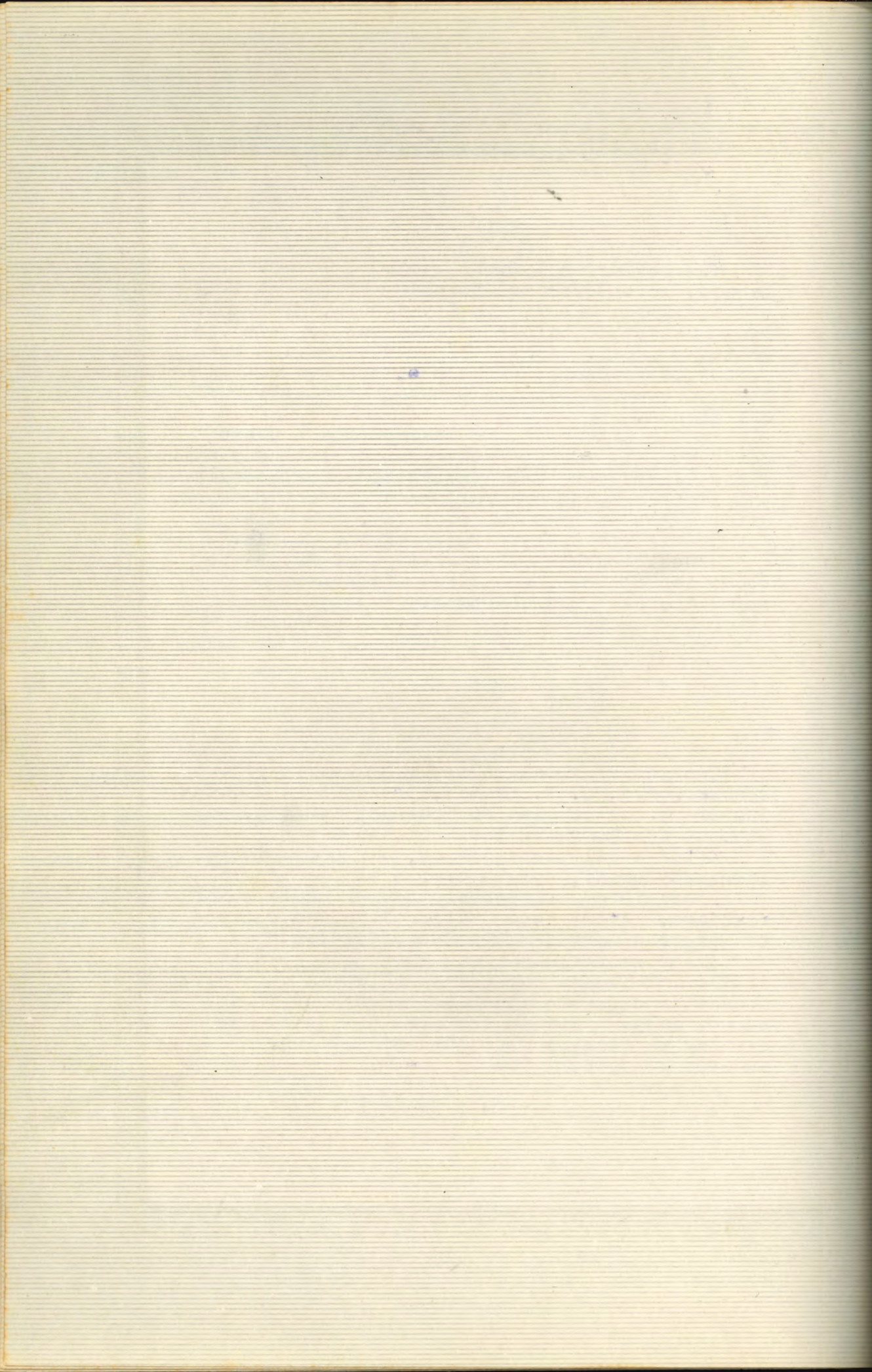
JUNIOR-SENIOR BANQUET

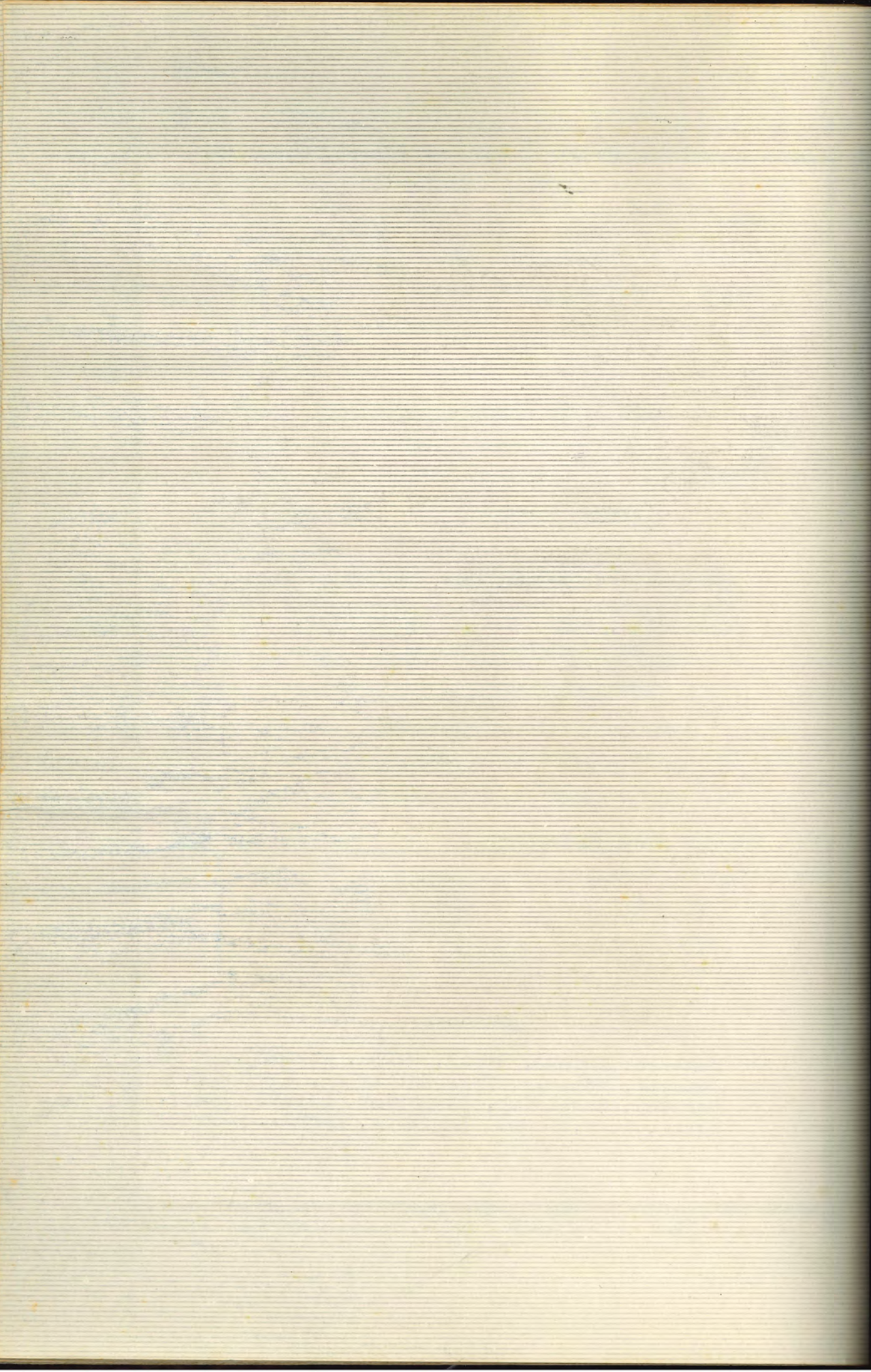


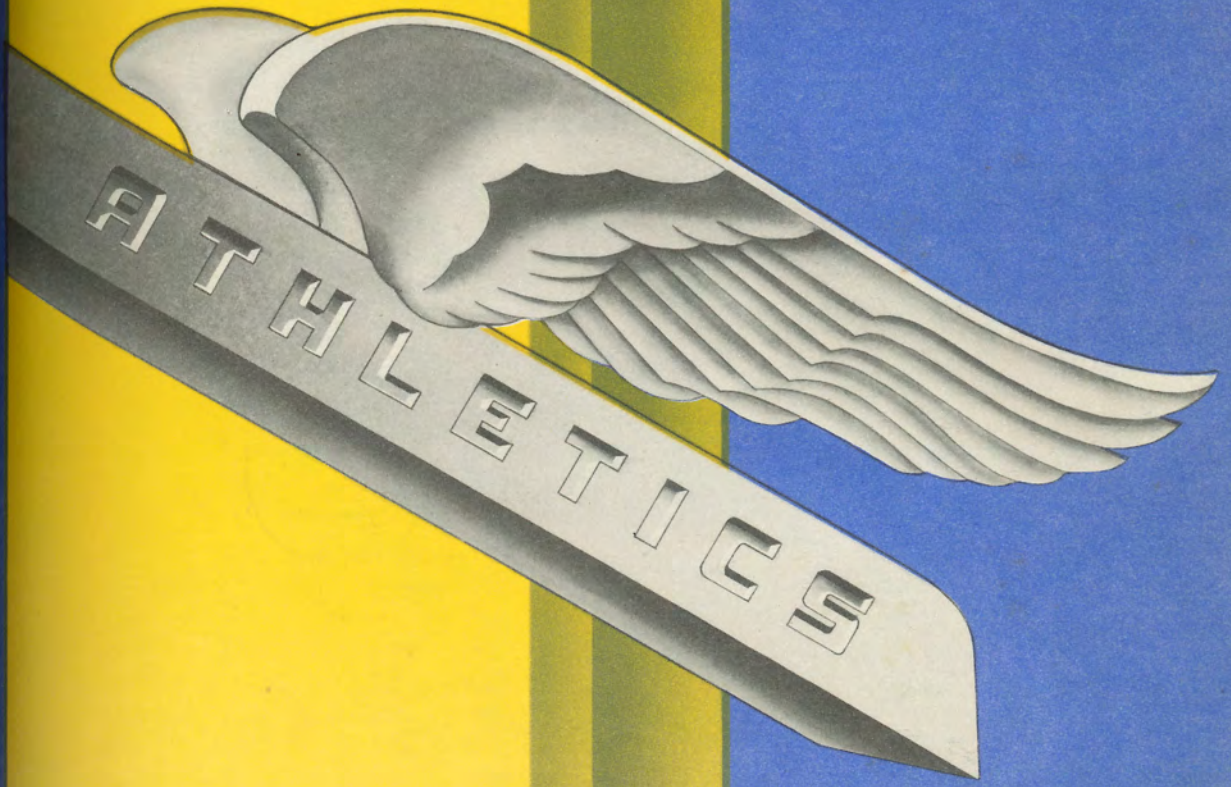

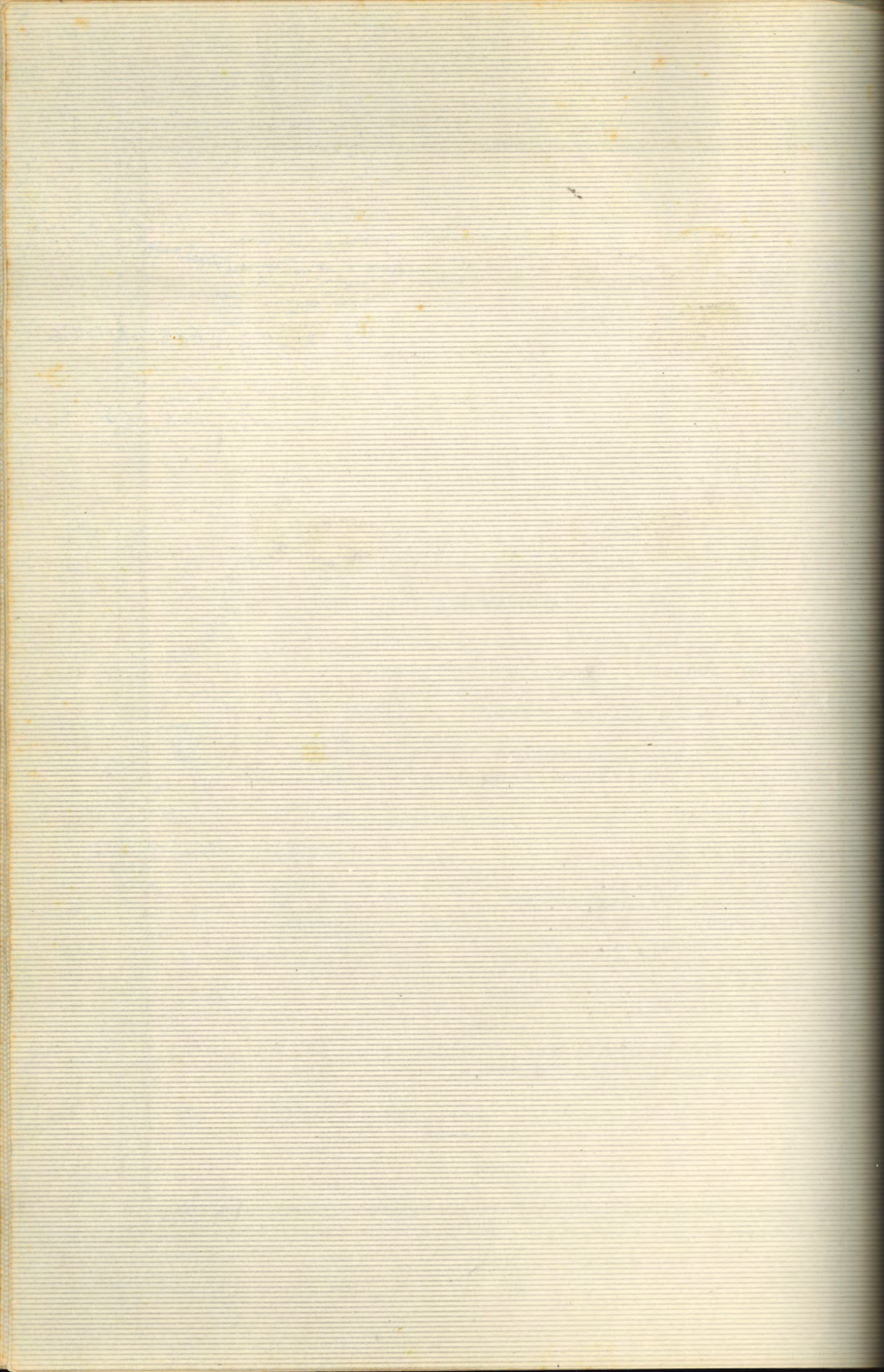
The Severance High School team concluded another successful season of basketball. The team was not fortunate in placing in the tournament but it offered several exciting games.

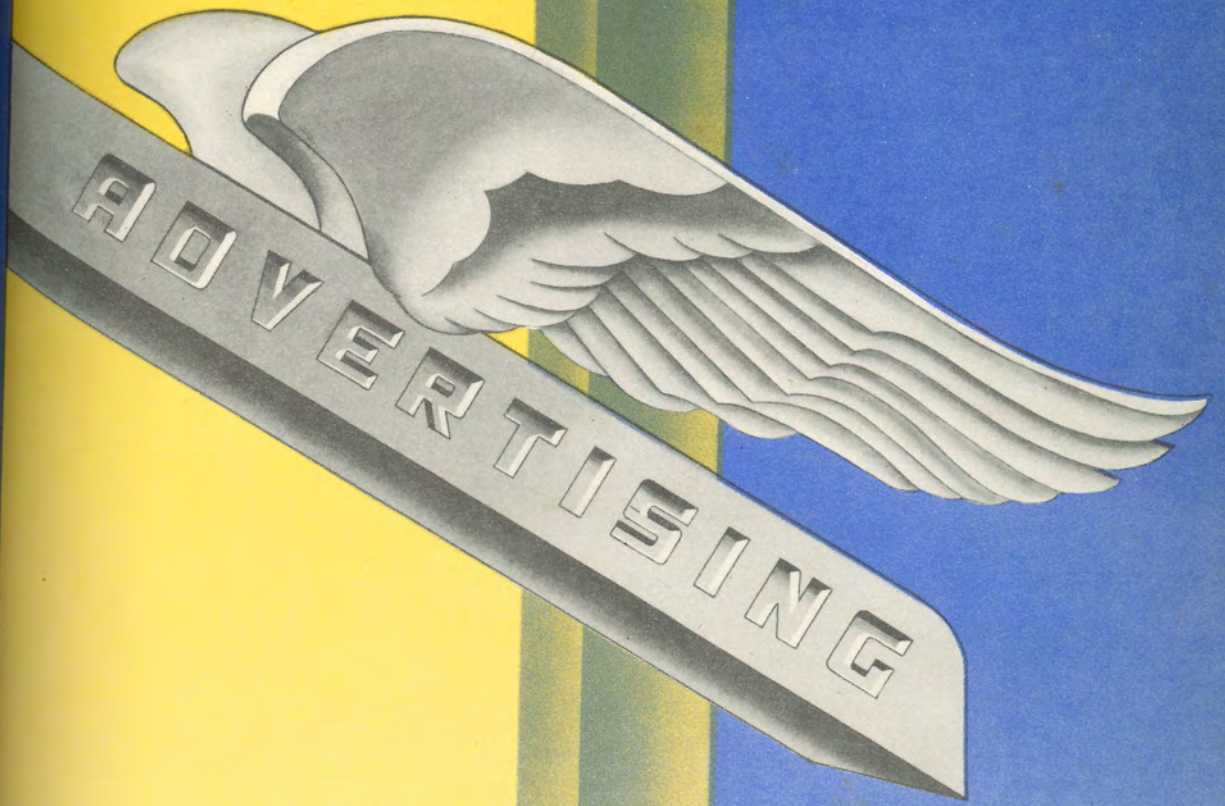
